Menn House Proposal Stirs Controversy"

Pennsylvania Street is the scene of yet another controversy over a land use issue. This time, the controversy is not about a tavern; it is about Penn House. The Penn House staff recently announced plans to tear down their present structure at 1035 Penn. and to erect a new building on that site.

Amid hot tempers, name calling, innuendo and threats of violence, the ELIA Executive Board met in August with representatives of Penn House and voted to oppose commercial rezoning of the property at 1035 Penn. The area is currently zoned for residential use, and the Penn House operation does not conform with that zoning. The ELIA Board also passed a resolution to seek to work out differences with Penn House peacefully to the benefit of the East Lawrence neighborhood which both organizations serve.

Opposition to the Penn House project was based on a number of factors. Opponents claim that the current building is a viable historic structure which Fenn House could sell for rehabilitation as housing, and then build elsewhere more economically than they could demolish and rebuild at the There was also opposition to any zoning change which could open the door to commercial encroachment in the event that Penn House ceases operation. Some critics find the proposed structure to be an ugly replacement for a beautiful old house, citing that the new building is a block structure, having no windows on three sides. Finally, they oppose the design which shows a parking lot and loading dock in the front of the new Penn House. They charge that a bigger, better Penn House will generate more traffic on the street and will be a nuisance. Continued > p.4

DOWNTOWN Lawrence



The City's comprehensive plan for Downtown is nearing completion, and Rhode Island Street residents are battling to make sure that their street remains a residential street in the process. The City's consultant on Downtown planning, Teska and Associates, designed one alternative plan which would close New Hampshire Street between 7th and 9th Streets, diverting Downtown traffic to Rhode Island Street. Other Teska proposals would encourage development of multi-family housing along the west side of the 900 and 1000 blocks of Rhode Island, and would call for parking lots on the west side of the 700 and 800 blocks.

At the September 23 meeting of the City's Planning Commission, Janet Hoffman, who recently bought and is upgrading the house at 728 Rhode Island, outlined the ELIA's position. The ELIA and Rhode Island Street neighbors find the closing of New Hampshire Street unacceptable, oppose any RM-3 high density zoning along the street, and oppose any curb cuts along Rhode Island for parking. Ms. Hoffman pointed out that the East Lawrence Neighborhood Plan calls for medium density housing in the area and stresses rehabilitation and preservation rather than redevelopment. Ms. Hoffman noted that a parking lot should not be built until an actual need is demonstrated, and that a green space would make a better "buffer" than parking. She pointed out that existing City lots in the 800 block of Rhode Island are usually empty. Ms. Hoffman said that meaningful public transportation would lessen the need for more asphalt.

Susie Ashline, Don Brownstein, Jim Powers and Richard Kershenbaum also spoke at the meeting, reiterating Ms. Hoffman's points, and raising questions about eminent domain, buffer zones and freestanding stores. All of these people own property along Rhode Island Street and are making considerable investments in rehab work. Lance Burr, whose law office, recently rehabbed home and rental properties are in East Lawrence, asked the Commissioners to "slow down" and preserve what is nice in the town. Barry Shalinsky, 633 Connecticut, said the plan should meet real needs, not create artificial demands. Accordingly, Shalinsky said, a Downtown grocery store should be given higher priority than a hotel complex.

Despite these comments from East Lawrence residents, the Planning Commission voted to send the Teska recommendations to the City Commission without alteration. That makes it important for East Lawrence people to attend the City Commission meeting on Tuesday, October 13th to show support for our Rhode Island Street neighbors, as well as to comment on other aspects of the Downtown Plan. The Teska Report and the East Lawrence Neighborhood Plan are available to be read at the ELIA Office during regular office hours, for persons wishing to prepare for the meeting.

The ELIA thanks over twenty people from East Lawrence, mostly Rhode Island Street neighbors, who attended the Planning Commission meeting. If these people, and more, voice their opinions to the City Commission, Downtown redevelopment could enhance rather than destroy our neighborhood.

It's been a long time coming, but residents of Hast 13th Street are finally getting their rusty water problem solved. City crews have started installing a new water main which will provide clean water (water that's as clean as anywhere else in town, anyway) to parts of East Lawrence and Far East Lawrence. After long months of battling with City Hall. East 13th Street residents, with the help of Stormy Samuel of the ELIA staff, secured a promise from the City to build the new water lines with money from the Community Development budget. The construction currently happening along 13th Street is proof that neighbors working together can make basic changes in their lives. And there's nothing more basic than water.

Council on Aging is looking for volunteers to deliver noontime meals to temporary shut-ins over 60 years of age. Volunteers would be assigned to deliver meals in their own area of Lawrence, and would be reimbursed at the rate of 20% per mile. Project SEAL, designed to Save Energy Around Lawrence is off to a great start. At a September workshop, the staff from the Appropriate Technology Center told participants about energy conservation techniques such

as hot water heater insulation, faucet aerators, stopping infiltration of cold winter air through electrical switches and outlets, proper installation of caulking and weatherstripping, etc.

There were more workshop participants from East Lawrence than from all of the other Community Development target neighborhoods com-Over a dozen East Lawrence households received free kits of energy conservation materials valued at \$50. The kits are available for low and moderate income people. Workteams were formed and East Lawrence residents helped each other to install the energy conservation materials. All participants, regardless of income, received a coupon booklet, good for discounts on energy saving materials from local hardware stores.

The Project SEAL workshop on low-cost/no-cost energy saving techniques will be repeated at 1 p.m. on Saturday, October 17 at the South Park Recreation Center, 12th and Mass.
