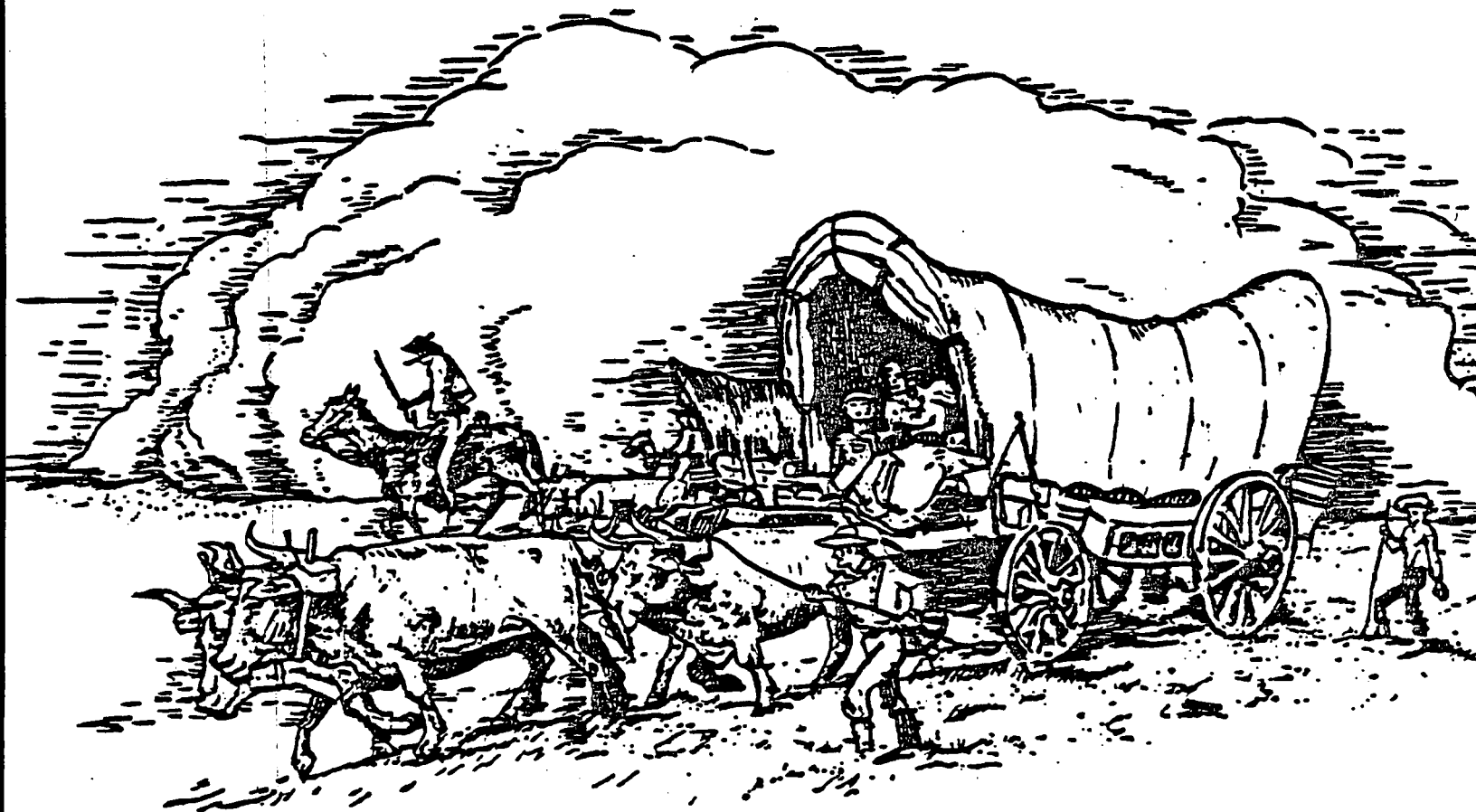

Three Parties of Emigrants Who Came to Lawrence, Kansas Under the Auspices of the Emigrant Aid Society.

Anson J. Stone called and sworn.

To Mr. Sherman:

I reside in Boston, Massachusetts. I am assistant treasurer of the Emigrant Aid Society. A record is kept by that society of the names of those emigrants who are sent out under its auspices. The party of emigrants under Dr. Robinson, who went out in the spring of 1855, left Boston March 13, 1855. I have a list of those who composed that party, copied from the original register in the office of the company by myself. The list is contained in a memorandum book, and is attached to this deposition. The book also contains the names of those who went out in company with John T. Farwell, leaving Boston March 20, 1855.

The number of persons who have been sent out by the Emigrant Aid Society I should judge to be somewhere in the neighborhood of 1,300, but I cannot state, without looking over the books, what proportion were women and children, but there were many going out in families.

When Robinson's party left we had no information at all of the day of election. I do not think any party went out at all in reference to the day of election.

The emigrant aid society never paid the expenses of any emigrant. I am certain of this, because I have carefully examined all the books and papers of the society. They have expended no money for firearms or ammunition. They have been extremely careful in regard to that matter, and avoided it in any way. The money of the society has been expended in saw and grist mills, the hotel in Lawrence, and in other buildings; and in no case has money been expended with any reference to the political opinion of settlers; but all could enjoy the facilities of the investments of the society. The company did not issue tickets of their own, but purchased tickets of the various lines of transportation, and sold them to the emigrants for cost. A conductor was sent along with each party, but the company in no case paid his fare, but he was furnished with a free ticket by the various lines of travel. The transportation companions made the same deduction on the tickets they sold to us at a reduced rate, as they did to all other companies, picnic parties, conventions, &c.

This is the mode in which business has been ordinarily done between the company and the emigrants. When an emigrant comes into the office and asks about Kansas, for information, &c., we give him a pamphlet containing all the information we have been able to gather. It did not contain any special price of his fare to the Territory; and when he asked what that would be, we would state what the railroads would furnish tickets for. They would naturally come to our office to inquire this, because it is the office of the Kansas Emigrant Company. This pamphlet of information is prepared and furnished, not

to persuade persons to emigrate, but to avoid the trouble of answering all the questions persons would probably ask us, by giving them the information they desire in a convenient form. We never urge them to go. Some, after reading our books, would conclude to go, while others would not. We could not tell how many did not go, but there were many who got these pamphlets did not go. As soon as enough concluded to go, to form a party, a conductor was sent along with the party. Their baggage was marked to facilitate and secure its transportation. The connexion between the company and the emigrant ceased when the ticket was sold, and there was no understanding, agreement, or promise on either side. No man ever went under the auspices of this society, for the mere purpose of voting and then returning, so far as I know.

The early records call it Oakland Cemetery.

The cemetery is "the Baldwin City cemetery of the Kansas Educational association of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Baker University turned over the maintenance of this cemetery to the Oak-wood Cemetery (established in 1880) of Baldwin City.

When the entrance was built in 1954, the name used was "Pioneer Cemetery."

From address given by Dr. Homer K. Ebright, Baldwin City, Kansas at the re-dedication 6 June 1954 (Dedication May 31, 1854.)

In a copy of the early registration of this Baldwin City, cemetery bearing the date Sept. 14, 1864. It is signed by the Register of Deeds, James C. Horton. Names of officers: George W. Paddock-Pres; Henry W. Barricklow-Vice Pres.; Hugh D. Fisher-Secretary; Nathan Taylor-Treasurer. Also the names of Wm. H. Schofield, W. G. Piper, and Wm. Butt. Streets laid out in this cemetery. This long path east and west is names Mt. Vernon Street. Streets laid out north to south are called--Myrtle Avenue, Cypress Avenue, and Summit Avenue.

HISTORY OF CENTRAL UNITED METHODIST CHURCH
1501 Massachusetts, Lawrence, Kansas

The roots of Central United Methodist Church reach back to 1854 when the first United Brethren Church was organized in Lawrence. A man by the name of S. S. Snyder came to Lawrence in October, 1854. He was sent as a missionary and staked out a claim near the edge of Lawrence community, which was only about 600 persons.

During a period of years up to 1914, there were four different locations, most of them North of the Kansas River.

In 1914 a new brick building was erected at the corner of 17th and Vermont. It was known as "The S. S. Snyder Memorial" and was used until 1936 when the church was destroyed by fire. Efforts to raise money, keep the congregation together and build a new building were made but all efforts failed, and in 1946 the United Brethren merged with the Evangelical Church. This church was located at 1000 Connecticut.

This history dates back to the year 1909. The Evangelical Annual Conference met in Jewell, Kansas. At this Conference a mission was located in Lawrence and Rev. E. J. Fietz was appointed pastor. The church was named Zion Evangelical. There was a group of 26 members but they had no church to go to for worship.

Quarterly Conference met in June, 1909. There was a report that the Swedish Lutheran Church at 1000 Connecticut was for sale. This church was purchased for \$1,100.00. The building was in bad shape and needed much repair and remodeling. When the next Annual Conference met, they asked for financial help. The church was raised and re-sided with most of the labor being done by the men of the church. The new church was dedicated on September 3, 1911 with Emil Wendland as pastor.

The Ladies Aid was organized in 1913 and met each week for work. They also served many meals for 15¢ and 25¢ a meal to help with the expenses of the church.

It was decided in 1917 to improve the building again. So the basement was enlarged, a furnace was installed, and plans were made to purchase a parsonage. The house at 1009 Connecticut across the street from the church was purchased for \$3,500.00.

In 1919 a Woman's Missionary Society was organized. Money for missions was collected and sent to the missionaries. Many days were spent in sewing and large packages of clothing for infants and children and other needs of the missionaries, were sent.

The church was partially destroyed by fire in 1920.

During the years the congregation had been growing until in 1944, they felt the need of more room and wished for a new church. The trustees were given the power to start a building fund. Their first effort brought in \$2,200.00. I believe Rev. George Landes was the pastor at the time.

In 1945 Leland and Elaine Young were sent to the Lawrence Church. They were a young and enthusiastic couple who put forth every effort toward organizing and planning for the new church.

At Quarterly Conference in 1945 it was voted to have the District Superintendent, E. E. Erffmeyer, to present the building project to Annual Conference. In May of 1945 \$10,000.00 was allowed. Then there was an appeal to the General Board of Missions for an additional \$10,000.00. In 1947 the Conference Youth Fellowship made the Lawrence Church a missionary project with a goal of \$5,000.00. The church was still a mission at that time. During this

time the United Brethren and Evangelical Churches merged. The merger took place in 1946.

Property was purchased at 15th and Massachusetts in November of 1945. This site was chosen because the lots were available. It was not far from the old location and was conveniently located in the town.

In 1946 Norman Goode was employed as architect and in 1947 Ray Angeny was hired as contractor. During August, 1947 ground was broken for the new building and by October the corner stone was laid. Mooris Cleveland made a metal container to place the articles in and Lawrence Monument Company furnished the corner stone. Items in the corner stone are: a church hymnal, a Church Discipline, a copy of blueprints for the new building, a list of church members, a list of building committee members, a few pieces of money, a copy of Journal World newspaper, and a new copy of the Holy Bible.

The note burning service was held October 6, 1957 with District Superintendent Henry H. Vogel present. Leland H. Young continued to be the pastor until May, 1958.

Work progressed rapidly and the church kept growing spiritually as well as in membership. The Sunday out family put our letters in the church, 23 persons were taken into church membership. Work continued on the new building. R. O. Burgert spent most of his waking hours at the site to see that the project was carried out as it should be. Mr. Burgert was Chairman of the Building Committee. Leland Young put on his unionalls and spent many, many hours supervising and suggesting with much interest and concern for the best possible results. These men's very lives and souls became entwined in the bricks and rafters of the building. Many others helped in various ways.

During the week of September 15-19, 1948, the church was dedicated with services each night and Sunday, both morning and afternoon, with a basket dinner at the noon hour. The dedication service was held Sunday afternoon with presentation of memorials and gifts, as well as the building fund offering. Bishop C. H. Stauffacher was present to give the dedication sermon.

Another parsonage was purchased in 1954 at 1530 Kentucky.

The church and Sunday School membership continued to grow until the class rooms were bursting at the seams. In 1957 a house and lot at 1507 was bought for an annex to be used for class rooms. During this time the members of the church built a nice cabin in Forest Park to be used by the youth of the church.

The house being used for an annex became unsafe and parking space was needed, so the house was razed and the house across 15th Street was bought for another annex. There was much more room for the children's classes and Bible School. This did well for several years until it was condemned as unsafe and later was sold.

The house directly back of the church was bought for a parsonage and later the house and lot south of the parsonage was purchased. The house was moved to make more spaces for parking. This connected Vermont Street with the parking lot.

After the annex north of the church was not used, the children's classes were brought back to the church. It seemed now was the time to begin planning for an educational wing for the church. During the 60's there were many trials runs to get the project of building started. In 1972 the program of an addition was begun in earnest.

When the Evangelical United Brethren denomination and the Methodist denomination merged, we needed a name to distinguish our identity in the town and Conference. After a fellowship dinner one evening in the church, the name Central was decided upon as being the most suitable.

Ground breaking for the new wing was one Sunday after the moening wor-ship on November 12, 1972. Ernest Moore was pastor during this period of building. The new educational wing was completed and consecrated on Palm Sunday, April 7, 1974. The architect was Will Owens. The building committee was: Chairman, Stan Zaremba; Secretary, Bob Schrock; Treasurer, Earlin Bur-gert. Others on the committee were Ken Jorgensen, director of construction, O. H. Garber, John Kliever, James Miller, Frank Pippert, and Bob Street. Orville Carey was Chairman of the Trustee Board. The building was constructed at a cost of \$150,000.00. The Consecration Celebration was attended by Bishop Dixon, who gave the Consecration sermon, and a delicious luncheon which had been arranged and cooked by Lorraine Schrock and Lois Zaremba, and an open house followed.

Later in the 70's the church underwent another rejuvenation. The room which had originally been the Chapel was made into a church parlor and named the Ingle Parlor. When the men's Bible Class was no longer in existence, the room was made into a library and resource room. The old fellowship hall was remodeled and made into a Youth Center. The old kitchen was enclosed and shelves were added to make storage room for tools and other equipment. A nice nursery room was made from some small classrooms.

Name Changing Probably Started in the Days of Ancient Rome

One of my sons, flipping through a new paperback called, "The Book of People," wanted to know why so many performers and other people in the public eye had changed their names, and how long this had been going on. Forever, I told him.

It began, as so many other things did, among the ancient Romans. Those men who were called to the equestrian order, and had low or "vulgar" names, were newly named for the occasion, so that the former name would not disgrace the dignity of the new position.

According to Platina, the first pope who changed his name in ascending to the papal throne was Sergius II in 844, because his proper name was "Hog's mouth"--quite unsuitable to the pomp of the tiara.

Europeans began changing their names in the Middle Ages, when surnames first came into vogue, because so many of the cognomens they bore were derogatory: "The Bald," "The Lame," "The Short", "The One-Eyed", and so forth.

Then, as society ranked itself, from serfs up to the nobility, the families who were able to raise themselves an economic niche or two often added a "De" or a "Von" before their names, even when they were not entitled to.

Beethoven, in fact, was taken to a plebeian court when it was discovered that, despite the "van" in his name, he was not of noble birth. His grandfather, a Flemish vintner, had simply appropriated the aristocratic prefix for himself. And he was only one of many, in most European countries where patents of nobility prevailed.

(In court, it is said, when Beethoven was questioned, he pointed to his head and heart, exclaiming, "My patent nobility is here and here!")

In the New World, immigrants changed their names to blend with the ethnic majority. Paul Revere's father, indeed, had changed his name from "Rivoire," upon arriving here from France. Much earlier, the great explorer Giovanni Caboto, changed his name in middle age to John Cabot, when he moved from Venice to London and discovered Newfoundland for the British.

It has been going on ever since--not merely among performers, but in public life as well: at least four U. S. Presidents so disliked their first names that they abandoned them for professional careers: Hiram Ulysses Grant, Steven Grover Cleveland, Thomas Woodrow Wilson, and John Calvin Collidge.

That probably began when Caius Julius Caesar dropped his first name, too--no doubt knowing that his family name would live on in KING, CZAR, and KAISER. There is far more in a name than wide-eyed little Juliet ever realized.

RURAL SCHOOLS AND SCHOOLHOUSES OF DOUGLAS COUNTY, KANSAS

by Goldie Piper Daniels

WEYBRIGHT SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 4:

The first organized district in this neighborhood was established in 1873 when John C. and Christina Metsker deeded one acre of land for a school site.

This school was first called Webber; then Alfred; and in 1904, the name was changed to Weybright.

In 1898 the district board members were A. A. WEBBER, W. POSTMA AND B. L. HOOVER. The teacher was SONORA METSKER. Those of school age in the district in 1898 were Henry, Charlie, Bertha, Maggie and Irvin DAVIS; Arther and Myrtle FISHER; Oscar and Joseph HARTMAN; Charles, Bert, Wegie, Clarence, Lloyd, Otis and Nellie HOOVER; Iva, Lottie, Ida, Ada, Grace, Wegie and Otto METSKER; John, Perry and Asa POSTMA; Don, Effa, Ray and Grace ROELFSZ; Ida and Myrtle SHIVELY; Gertrude and Ora SMITH; Maud, Lola and Melvin STUTSMAN; Gilbert, Ernest, Mabel and Lena THURMER; Venice, Cynthia, Mamie and Dovia WATSON; Edna, Lloyd and Chloe WILLS; John Zimmer.

The 1898-99 term was taught by MARTIN WOODWARD, and that of 1899-1900 by RACHEL FISHER. The board members were A. A. WEBBER, I. L. HOOVER and B. L. HOOVER. Teachers from 1900 through 1910 were RACHEL FISHER, MARY HENSON, EVA HELLSTROM, S. B. KATHERMAN, LIZZIE POSTMA, NELLIE DE HEK, EMMA PINE, EVA LUTZ, WILMA VAN HORN and CORA COFFMAN. Board members were I. L. HOOVER, HENRY E. WARD and A. A. WEBBER.

Teachers from 1910 through 1920 were ROSA E. TURNER, JESSIE MOOR, B. F. ALLISON, WANETA SMITH, CARL WEBBER, VERA CLARK, A. V. KALB, GENEVA PRESTON and JOHN A. GODFREY. Board members of 1920 were S. H. GRAMMER, H. W. BEHRENS and J. S. DILLON.

During the 1930's the teachers were FLORENCE SMITH, FAY WINTERMANTEL, HERSCHEL HEMPHILL, ANNE KELLEY, VIOLA HIRD, BETTY HAMMOND and EUNICE O'BRIEN. Board members in 1940 were H. L. DILLON, MRS. CLYDE B. HOOVER and CHAS. WEYBRIGHT.

In 1959, the district was disorganized and consolidated with Wakarusa Valley District No. 98.
