Report of the Librarian.

TO THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE
LAWRENCE FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY:

Herewith is respectfully submitted my report of the work of the Lawrence Free Public Library during its eleventh fiscal year ending December 31, 1915.

A year testing to the limit the resources of the library, and the energy of the librarians, has just passed.

The total circulation has succeeded by 66 that of any previous year in the history of the library. The next largest was that of 1905, the first year of a Free Public Library in Lawrence, when the circulation was 47,418 vols. of fiction out of a total of 50,903.

The fiction circulation for 1915 has gained 394 only over that of 1914, while the non-fiction has gained 2,017.

The steady gain in the non-fiction circulation shows for itself the increased demands made by the public and student.

As was stated last year, the fiction circulation takes in most cases, the librarian's time for the charging and discharging only, as with the open shelf system, the borrowers are privileged to select their own books. This year 31,009 have been charged out which means the handling of double that number, or 62,018, no small item itself.

The non-fiction circulation was 8,726. This means that a very large percent of 8,726 people had the personal attention for varied lengths of time, of one or more of the librarians.

And all this proves the public library is taking its legitimate place as an educational and recreative asset of the city.

In the juvenile department the fiction circulation lost 430, while the non-fiction gained 33.

Parents are curtailing, more and more, the reading of library books during the school year, as the children's interest in them often proves detrimental to their school work. There is also a growing sentiment that some time outside of school hours should be spent in outdoor exercises and home duties.

Then, too, with the growing demands in the adult department, it has been impossible to push the work with the children even to the amount desired.

Time was when the children's librarian was in disgrace who could not point to doubled circulation statistics; but the pendulum is swinging back to normal and now fewer books, more carefully chosen, is the standard the librarian tries to instill into the receptive mind of the juvenile reader.

The total circulation for 1914 was 48,955, making a gain of 2,014 for 1915.

The library was closed two weeks in June for repairs, thus reducing the circulation somewhat.

The largest circulation for the month was 5,616, in March. This was the largest monthly circulation in the history of the library. The largest day in 1915 was 347 on March 20th. The smallest month was 3,457 in September. The smallest day was September 8th, when the circulation was 79.

The total accessions for the year were 929, 879 by purchase and 50 by gift. Of those purchased 29 were from the Perkins Memorial Fund, making a total of 304 of the most valuable books in the library purchased from that fund since its acquisition in 1907.

The list of donors of books is as follows: Teutonia Club, Bureau of Railway Economics, N. Y. Stock Exchange, Japan Society, Good Health Publishing Co., Church Peace Union, Government Printing Office, Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, New Zealand Government, and the authors and publishers of various subjects: Miss Byrd, Miss Gladys McAtee, Watkins' Bank, Mr. A. L. Griggs, Sir Gilbert Parker, Mrs. A. E. N. Raymond, Mr. G. W. Maffett, Mr. A. Shadwell, Mr. Slason Thompson, Mr. C. H. Tucker, Mr. S. D. Bishop, Mrs. R. B. Preuszner, Dr. A. W. Clark and Dr. E. Bumgardner. The latter's gift of a set of Nelson's Loose Leaf Encyclopaedia in 12 vols. is a valuable acquisition. It is not entered with the 1915 accessions, as the reference room is already crowded.

There have been 443 vols. rebound and 90 vols. of current periodicals bound; 269 less than last year.

During the short hour days of July and August, many of the closed hours were spent in the basement arranging, checking and classifying the Kansas documents. There are now on the shelves 290 vols. of House and Senate documents and reports of various state Boards, besides 10 pamphlet cases of paper bound printed matter. These have never been accessioned but are at the disposal of the public when needed. Forty bound vols. of old Lawrence newspapers dating back to 1862, a gift of Mrs. John Hutchings, were labeled and arranged chronologically, and 86 unbound vols. of duplicate periodicals were sifted from a mass of gift magazines and made ready for the bindery.

At the request of a committee from the Christian Science Church all books dealing with the subject of Christian Science were transferred from mind cure to religion, or from 615.851 mental therapeutics to 289.9 minor Christian sects. As both are consistent with our classification system, we re-classified, labeled, carded, pocketed and catalogued.

On October 4th, the librarians gave their annual library talks to the High School freshmen. The classes were unusually bright and interested and the value of these talks shows daily in the increasing ease with which the boys and girls attack their reference work.

During the months of March, April and May the children's story hour was resumed and stories were told twice a week by K. U. girls under the direction of Miss Edwards. Fairy stories, nature stories and the classics such as Beowulf, King Arthur, Pied Piper and Jason and the Golden Fleece were told, all with the thought of creating in the minds of the children a taste for good literature. There was an average attendance of 48.

The fifth biennial registration of card holders closed July 31st, with 4963 registrations, 4078 adult and 855 juvenile. The sixth registration opened August 1st with 1018 and on December 31st the registration numbered 2744.

All things considered, which to nearly every librarian means too little money to work with, the development of the library has been everything that could be desired.

The loyal co-operation of the library staff has had its full place in the year's progress.

For the many courtesies and the active interest of the members of the Library Board, the librarian makes grateful acknowledgment.
